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
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CORONAVIRUS- AN UNPRECEDENTED AND SURREAL EXPERIENCE

A novel strain of coronavirus-SARS-COV-2 was first detected in December 2019 in Wuhan, a city in China's Hubei province with a population of 11 million, after an outbreak of pneumonia without an obxious cause. The virus has now spread to over 200countries and territories across the globe, and was characterized as a pandemic by the World Health Organisation (WHO) on 11March 2020. SARS-COV-2 belongs to a family of single stranded RNA virus which affects mammals, birds and reputiles

In humans, it commonly cause mild infections, similar to the common cold and respiratory tract infection. The disease can spread from person to perso through small droplets from the nose or mouth which are spread when a person with COVID-19 coughs or exhales.

Indian sectors that need urgent help as virus ravages economy. Some of the strongest economies around the globe are struggling to cope with the situation to cope with the situation in the wake of an unprecedented demand shock and a shutdown of all key economic activities that drive growth.

Many sectors are now in critical need of a relief package for better position amid the crisis:

1. MSME Sector

The Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises are literally the backbone of all Indian sectors and often engaged in manufacturing and export activities – the key drivers of the Indian economy. Almost all MSMEs are out of action due to the lockdown, chocking all production activities at major firms across sectors. MSMEs are reeling under crisis sand have no money to pay their employees. MSMEs will enter "uncharterd territory" urged the government to provide cash infusions.

2. Tourism and Hospitality sector

The tourism sector was the first to get disrupted by the impact of Covid-19 aand will be the last to see a resumption of avtivities. 53% of the total leading hotel operators have shutdown. Over 60% of respondents have upto 10% of their hotels servings as quarantine facilities.

3. Aviation sector

The crucial aviation sector that connects nations across the world is witnessing a flurry of layoffs and pay cuts. From a point of complete-suspension of travel, recovery is likely to be slow. The firm said the Indian aviations sector may be reduced to just two or three players, from more than half a dozen including Air India, Indigo, Spicejet and Goair.

4. Education sector

Sometime in the second week of March, state governments across the country began shutting down schools and colleges as a measure to contain the spread of the novel coronavirus. There is crucial time for the board exams, nursery school admission, entrance test for various universities and competitive examination among others, are all held during this period. Students who had enroll in universities abroad, especially US, UK have now been bared from leaving these countries.

5. Beauty Industry

The fallouts of Covid-19 on Indian skincare and makeup brands and the domestic beauty business.

As the coronavirus continues to spread, the number of detections and deaths rising daily, beauty brands are now faced by an unprecedented crisis. 6. Entertainment sector

The International Indian Film Academy Award planned to take place on 27 March was cancelled. Cinema halls were shut down. All video streaming services, jointly decided to offer only SD quality content on cellular networks.

7. Service sector

India's service sector activity contracted during March as the Covid-19 pandemic dented demand, particularly in overseas markets. The HIS Market India was at 49.3 in March, down from February's 85-month high of 57.5, as the new coronavirus pandemic pulled the service sector into contraction.

INTERNATIONAL WEBINAR ON ATMA NIRBHAR BHARAT,2020: BUILD LOCAL TO GO GLOBAL-ISSUES AND CONCERNS ON 3RD AND 4TH OCTOBER, 2020

"A nation's strength ultimately consists in what it can do on its own and not in what it can borrow from others". This quote by Indira Gandhi is what our present Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi is trying to accomplish. A country can achieve success and will prosper when the people of that country are self-reliant and do not depend on the imports of goods, services and technologies of other countries. In such a pandemic when our nation is already standing among the top three countries who have the highest number of COVID-19 patients, our Prime Minister has taken a big step by banning a total of '50 Chinese apps' in India.

On the 12th of May 2020, Modi announced the economic package related to the coronavirus pandemic and mentioned the ATMANIRBHAR BHARAT INITIATIVE. The main aim of this programme is to make India 'SELF-RELIANT'. During this pandemic, the Government of India (GOI) made the RBI infuse INR 20 lakh crore liquidity in the economy. More than 3000 MNCs were called to set up their base in India. The production in the domestic country was also increased upto 10 times creating a lot of employment opportunities. Also, the MNREGA scheme funded by the Government helped the migrated labourers to earn during this pandemic situation. The programme focused on promoting local goods, trying to make India a bigger and important part of the global economy and helping the three different sectors, i.e., primary, secondary and tertiary, to become strong and face competition. The 'Self Reliant India' initiative wants to protect 'infant industries', boost private sectors and change the definition of MSMEs (micro, small and medium enterprises). Also on the occasion of Independence Day, Modi ji focused on the 'MAKE IN INDIA' scheme again, which is a repackaged version of this initiative. New taglines 'vocal for local' were introduced. Many people had confused themselves with the terms — Self Reliant and Self Sufficiency. But our Finance Minister in his speech clarified that 'Atmanirbhar Bharat' does not mean to cut off from the rest of the world but is to produce upto our potential and to increase FDI (foreign direct investment). India, a nation suffering from trade deficit due to huge imports, will be able to correct it's BOP. The call for banning of Chinese apps and products and promoting 'Made in India' first showed some difficulty in practical as billion worth of imports was done every year, but now the imports have fallen to 25% as compared to 2019. Not only this, but our Defense Minister, Mr Rajnath Singh, announced that the Defence Ministry is now ready for a big push by imposing an import embargo on 101 items in a staged manner for over 5 years.

If this programme launched by the Indian government is implemented by all, a drastic change will come soon which will lead to an improved and standardised living environment. It will make India a country which will have people no longer begging for food, below the poverty line and will instead lead to improve all political, social and economical factors of our country.

RECIPES

TROPICAL MELON SMOOTHIE

Ingredients:

Puja Gupta (6th Sem)

3/4 cup reduced-fat milk, 1/2 cup chopped cantaloupe

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped papaya, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup frozen mango chunks

4-6 ice cubes, Lime zest for garnish

Directions:
